The Kūki'o Community Fund has been able to help my family to take away a lot of stress from tuition costs and allows me to have time to focus more on my studies."

In his younger years, the Kūki'o K-12 scholarship provided DeMarques and his family the opportunity to pursue a private education that would have otherwise been out of reach, "They knew they were going to have to sacrifice a lot for me to attend that school and they did it willingly." This switch led DeMarques to join extracurricular activities throughout his high school career that ranged from sports, performing arts, and student leadership, laying a foundation for educational success, "All of these things were able to help me develop the leadership and communication skills that I use now."

DeMarques' mom, Stella, began working at Kūki'o in November of 2016 during her last year of Culinary school at Pālamanui, "As a teen mom, I didn't have the opportunity to go to college right after graduating high school, but eventually found a passion in baking and decided to get a degree 20 years later now that my boys are grown."

The committee is led and facilitated by HCF's Hawai'i Island-based staff who provide a local, professionally-managed, and cost effective mechanism for the fund's grantmaking and operations.
