IGNITING OPPORTUNITY

The Ēlama project at Pālamanui directly reflects the Kūki'o Community Fund's long history of investing in youth success in school, work, and life. This 13th-year program fosters non-college bound students to complete associates degrees and work-ready certificates. Since 2015, this program has witnessed the completion of 110 degrees and certificates, and has inspired the establishment of a sister program in East Hawai'i through investments with like-minded philanthropic partners. Ēlama scholars inspire other previously non-degree-seeking students to invest in their own potential, and its students continue to consistently make the Dean's List.



AELYN IBARRA-MEDINA moved to Hawai'i at the age of 14 from her home in Mexico to join her 'ohana. She arrived with little understanding of the English language or local Hawaiian and American culture. She found her voice through art and quickly filled her time with this new passion while immersing herself in her studies and learning a new language. She excelled and completed a handful of early college courses, earned a 4.0 GPA, and was selected as class valedictorian. She was forced to reconsider her college plans when her mother was diagnosed with lung cancer, leaving her family in financial uncertainty. Aelyn sought out options that would allow her to lend support to her family, and was selected to join the Elama Project. Currently, Aelyn maintains a 4.0 GPA and is completing her prerequisites to transfer to the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa where she plans to pursue a bachelor's degree in Environmental Design in the School of Architecture.

Akeakamai ADVANCING KNOWLEDGE

Since 2017, the Kūki'o Community Fund has supported Kūki'o employees and dependents on their paths to success through scholarship opportunities for continued education at any accredited two- or four-year higher education institution. Scholarships are renewable, flexible, and available to Kūki'o employees, spouses, and their children and allow recipients to balance life commitments while pursuing part-time or full-time higher education. Kūki'o employee and dependent scholarships invest in our Kūki'o 'ohana and reflect our fund's mission of supporting youth success in school, work, and in life.

Since 2017, 17 Kūki'o employees and dependents have received \$127,167 in Kūki'o Community Fund scholarships to pursue college degrees and training.

Ka Ulu Na'auao ENLIGHTENED GROWTH

Through expanding partnerships with Hawai'i Island independent schools, the Kūki'o Community Fund offers financial aid to the children of Kūki'o employees attending kindergarten through high school by providing educational opportunities that may have otherwise been out of reach.

Since this scholarship program began in 2018, 23 Kūki'o employee families, including 29 students, have received a total of \$228,920 in scholarships to independent schools on Hawai'i Island.

All Kūki'o employee applicant families who display financial need have received scholarships from this program.

Kahi Ho'oku'i THE POINT OF CONNECTION

The Kūki'o Community Fund is committed to supporting youth career preparation opportunities through investment in Career Connected Learning (CCL). This program provides local students with hands-on, STEM-related learning in growing industries that pay higher-than-average wages and prepare K–12 students, including Kūki'o employee children, for careers that will better support the cost of living in Hawai'i.

In the five years since CCL began, the field of work-based learning both nationally and locally has evolved rapidly. The theory and practice of strengthening career pathways into living wage jobs for Hawai'i students has resulted in growing industries on-island with a local workforce that is prepared, trained, and enthusiastic about working in the fields of STEM. The Kūki'o Community Fund's investment in career training ensures that our local students are ready for innovative opportunities as they become available.


FRIENDS OF THE FUTURE

Friends of the Future's Career Pathways Alignment for Student Success (CareerPASS) provides students with a portfolio of activities and programs designed to facilitate collaboration among education, employment, and community partners. This program creates relevant, collective pathways that inspire students with a sense of career purpose, engaging them as learners. Through a variety of career readiness learning techniques that clarify the education process for students and families, students receive support for academic progress, connection, and resources. CareerPASS helps to transition students from high school to employment and/or ongoing post-high-school education, preparing them for career success here in Hawai'i.



STUDENT SUCCESS STORY

D'ARTAGNAN KUNISHIGE, a Friends of the Future internship student, used his STEM experience to secure a 3D printing apprenticeship with Big Island Face Shields and partnered with KōCreate Lab to manufacture and distribute personal protective equipment to the community. Kunishige, who is now a college student at Hawai'i Community College, then went on to teach 3D printing to students at Hāmakua Youth Center through Vibrant Hawai'i Resilience Hubs, and participated in KōCreate Lab's 2021 summer programs while also learning how to become a teaching assistant. This experience led to his most recent success: joining the staff at Honoka'a Intermediate School as its newly hired STEM coordinator. He now enjoys working with students at Kō Education Center three days a week.



"In Kō Education Center's Hāmākua-North Hawai'i service area, students are often tempted to adopt a deficit-focused narrative about lack of opportunities. With the help of the Career Connected Learning grants, Kō Education Center clearly demonstrates multiple STEAM opportunities for students in the area. ADAPTING TO THE FUTURE

THE SUCCESS FACTORY (TSF) builds our island economy by creating an engaged community that inspires and nurtures a skilled workforce ready for STEM careers locally. TSF provides ninth-grade students college-level training in coding, robotics and drones, real-world problem solving, career skills, STEM skills and STEM career explorations, all while offering hands-on mentoring to help guide students successfully through their chosen career pathways. Additionally, one-on-one career matches with current STEM professionals provide students with valuable insights on their desired careers, and help to establish professional relationships early.

AFTER SCHOOL ALL STARS (ASAS)

provides additional STEM education for more than 615 kindergarten through eighth-grade students in four Hawai'i Island middle schools. Students get the benefit of field trips, guest speakers, and STEM-specific classes, and program staff receive STEM training. ASAS builds relationships with students over the course of three years to increase interest in STEM learning, which more effectively inspires students' pursuit of STEM careers, as compared with one-time experiences. ASAS is currently the only free after-school STEM program for middle schools in Hawai'i.

HAWAI'I INSTITUTE OF PACIFIC

AGRICULTURE'S (HIP AG) High School Mahi'ai Mentorship and Post-secondary Farm Apprenticeship expands learning, awareness, and skills in agriculture and nutrition to ninth-grade to early career students with an interest in a career in agriculture. The apprenticeship program provides in-depth farming education to participants through 212 hours of classroom instruction and 6,500 hours of in-field training and hands-on experience in greenhouses, gardens, orchards, and fields. Each apprentice receives a wide range of training on skills that include food safety, market gardening, permaculture, Korean natural farming, agroforestry, beekeeping, crop design, planting, harvesting, herbal medicine making, and value-added food processing. Apprentices leave the program with an agricultural certificate, which can be leveraged to attain an agricultural job or to access agricultural loans to start their own operation.

COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGRAM

The Kūki'o Community Fund advances local youth-focused programs through Hawai'i Community Foundation's Community Grants program. This grantmaking vehicle provides critical support to community programs that directly impact our island youth outside of the classroom by:

EQUIPPING youth-centered educational projects with rich opportunities

ELEVATING educational experiences available in the greater community

IDENTIFYING unique learning environments with impactful and progressive programs

AIDING COMMUNITY LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS THAT SUPPORT EDUCATIONAL EXCELLENCE FOR OUR LOCAL YOUTH

The Kūki'o Community Fund's participation in Community Grants ensures that our investment in youth success benefits students beyond the classroom with unique learning opportunities that complement conventional education experiences.

The Kūki'o Community Fund's investment in youth success has transformed our island community. The generosity of our members continues to shape the future for our students and their families by ensuring that local youth are prepared for career opportunities here in Hawai'i.



KĪPUKA O KE OLA (KOKO) is a federally qualified rural health clinic located in Waimea, Hawai'i Island. KOKO has strategically expanded its services to include pediatric care, primary care, women's health, and traditional healing. This grant supported the staffing of behavioral health specialists to help families navigate new challenges and cope with increasing stress in ways that can strengthen a family instead of tearing it apart.

GIRL SCOUTS HAWAI'I (GSH) mission is to build girls of courage, confidence, and character who make the world a better place. GSH provides girls with experiences that improve their leadership abilities and increase their exposure to science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM)—sectors in which women are vastly underrepresented. This grant supported the Girl Scout Leadership Experience, providing youth development and educational opportunities for 332 girls across Hawai'i Island.

HO'ŌLA NĀ PUA, which means "New Life for our Children," is committed to the health, healing, and renewal of underage sex-trafficked youth. Its foundational premise is that the societal reintegration of children who have been commercially sexually exploited requires a social safety net, and a response framework that focuses on four critical program areas: health, education, advocacy, and reintegration. This grant supported the expansion of the Starfish mentoring program and the Hōkū program, which provides group activities for at-risk and victimized youth at the Salvation Army Noho 'Olu Girls Safe House and Youth Challenge Academy in Hilo.

THREE RING RANCH (TRR) benefits the environment through the education of Hawai'i children about their place in the natural world. TRR is Hawai'i's only accredited animal sanctuary, improving the lives of animals in its care. This grant supported the Animal Lady Online Science Adventure Series to educate Hawai'i Island youth about animal care.

Nearly \$7 million raised and distributed since 2001 to support educational opportunities, career readiness, and scholarships that benefit our island youth and Kūki'o family.
