Founded by Broadway actor and Parker Ranch heir, Richard Smart, Kahilu first raised its curtain in 1981. Since then, the theatre has grown to offer a variety of performing and visual arts and has recently expanded to create its own streaming platform: Kahilu TV.

Besides its ability to showcase exceptional local talent and demonstrate its support for multi-faceted engagement oppportunities to learn from local artists, Kahilu is best known in Kūki'o for the multitude of opportunities available for youth to learn and fall in love with performing arts. Students at Kahilu study acting, dance, singing, and crafting – skills that have led to countless success stories and flourishing careers.
