# **Promising Minds: Clinical Partnerships Funding Opportunity**



Online Application Deadline: Tuesday, July 05, 2022, 4:00 p.m. HST

#### **OVERVIEW**

Grant award available: up to \$100,000 for 15 months

The Promising Minds initiative works across early childhood and early care and learning environments to promote wellness in young children from birth through age 5, including the prenatal and postpartum period, by increasing the capacity of adults to support the social, emotional, and behavioral development of keiki using a variety of research-informed practices. We would like to expand this work to provide access points through clinical and health care settings. The goal of the program is to demonstrate high-impact partnerships with clinical and health care settings to integrate and sustain Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health (IECMH) principles in those settings. By doing so, we will increase access for families to IECMH services.

According to Zero to Three, infant and early childhood mental health (IECMH) is "the developing capacity of a child from birth to five years old to form close and secure adult and peer relationships; experience, express and manage a full range of emotions; and explore their environment and learn." Social emotional development and well-being of infants, toddlers, and preschoolers occur in the context of family, community, and culture. This can happen in a variety of settings: pediatric health care, early care and learning, home visiting, early intervention, judicial system, and more. Some professionals specialize in delivering IECMH support, such as trained IECMH consultants.

The Clinical Partnerships project developed out of the objectives in Hawai'i's <u>Integrated Infant and Early Childhood Behavioral Health Plan</u> which sets out objectives around systems changes including sustainable financing, increasing the specialized workforce, and improving access to programs and services for families. This project helps to meet and understand how to meet two key objectives:

- Policy & Systems—Financing utilizing a variety of sources
- Programs & Service—Expand access to IECBH services including health screenings, mental health assessment, prevention education services, developmental delay prevention activities, family therapy, multifamily group therapy, case management, mental health consultation, parenting education, and skills training.

The Plan also led to the development of a white paper *Advancing IECBH in Hawaii: Exploring Options for Financing Sustainability*. A recommendation in that paper is: Onboard New Providers of IECBH Services—Bill Medicaid for their services and determine needed changes for

Hawai'i (e.g., Infant Family Specialists Category 2 Endorsements). All these outlined objectives have led to the development of this funding opportunity for clinical partnerships.

# ELIGIBILITY & REQUIREMENTS Criteria

- Organizations applying must be a clinic, Federally Qualified Health Center, Native Hawai'i Health Care, or another health care provider.
- Serves a birth through age 5 patient population or whole family care through pediatrics, family medicine, or other practices.
- Providers may serve multiple counties.

#### **Desired Criteria**

- Have an existing behavioral health department, program, or provider on staff.
- Actively enrolled Hawai'i Medicaid provider.
- Have familiarity with Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health services, e.g. maternal depression screening, and dyadic treatment such as Child Parent Psychotherapy.
- Certification or commitment to trauma-informed care
- Priority will be given to applications serving rural, and/or Native Hawaiian, Micronesian, or other populations historically excluded from access to health care.
- Priority will go to applicants committed to working with patients or clients with any of
  the well-known risk factors that can negatively impact early relationships and social and
  emotional development, including prematurity and low birth weight, genetic disorders,
  exposure to substances, and exposure to violence, abuse, or chronic stress and
  adversity.

#### **Deliverables**

- 1. Complete a baseline scan of the applicant's current services and assessment of needs for additional services in your service reach area (your community). The narrative and qualitative scan would include items such as what services and treatments are currently offered for: infant and early childhood behavioral health, general and adult behavioral health, developmental screenings, parent/caregiver depression screenings, and social determinants of health screening. Additionally, the scan may include outlining how referrals are made for additional services and treatment such as with therapists, licensed clinical social workers, and other services for families;
- 2. Develop and implement a Work Plan with outcomes, benchmarks, and milestones. Work Plan may outline shared agency/agencies planning; child and family-focused IECMH treatment and consultation; and staff, parent, and community member training. Key areas to be addressed in the Work Plan include:

- Identify goals for staff training on IECMH principles, and complete needed staff training by end of the grant period;
- Complete staff training on trauma-informed care (if not previously completed);
- Plan for offering IECMH services at your site (or multiple sites) through a clinical partnership;
- Test and learn from an initial offering of IECMH services serving a target number of children and families identified in your Work Plan;
- Other identified, customized milestones
- 3. Applicants awarded grants agree to employ or contract qualified IECMH consultants, treatment providers, and supervisory staff. IECMH providers must be Endorsed<sup>1</sup> or working toward Endorsement).
- 4. Participate in a peer learning community (~3 times a year) with other providers in the Clinical Partnerships group, which may be expanded to include those in the Pediatric Mental Health Access Program<sup>2</sup> administered by the Department of Health; and
- 5. Participate in evaluation and learning, particularly on challenges and opportunities in implementation, the billing and financial model, and financial sustainability of services.

This application is available for online submission. Beginning January 2022, the Hawaii Community Foundation transitioned to a new Grants Portal. AIMH-HI holds the Endorsement license for Hawai'i.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> In 2021, the Hawai'i Department of Health (DOH) was one of 30 states to receive a \$2.2 million federal Pediatric Mental Health Care Access (PMHCA) grant to address pediatric mental health care for children and youth ages 3 to 21 years. The purpose of the PMHCA program is to promote behavioral health integration into pediatric primary care using telehealth, which has drastically increased during the COVID-19 pandemic to curb the spreading of the disease.
