OVERVIEW

Background

In 2016, during a meeting of the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) hosted by Hawai'i State, the state responded to the call from the Pacific regional and international community to achieve effective management of nearshore marine and 'āina resources. The Department of Land and Natural Resources Division of Aquatic Resources serves as the lead State agency for achieving nearshore marine management goals of this effort. The Hawai'i Community Foundation contributes to the achievement of effective nearshore marine management goals by serving as a philanthropic funding mechanism to support strong collaboration, community engagement, and co-management through the Holomua Marine Initiative Fund.

"The Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR) launched The Holomua Marine Initiative as a way to work with communities to effectively manage our nearshore marine resources around each main Hawaiian island so that our local resources are available and plentiful, today and for future generations. This is a new community-based planning approach to ensure local knowledge is guiding marine resource management planning at every step in the process.

Building on the rich and effective traditional management practices and knowledge of Hawai'i, along with guidance from fishers, cultural and scientific experts and community leaders, DAR has outlined a path built on four pillars:

1. **Place-based planning** aims to identify and develop management strategies for improved marine management in partnership with communities and stakeholders at local to regional scales.
2. **Pono Practices** encourages responsible behavior guided by Hawaiian values and perspectives through education and outreach, statewide rules, strengthened enforcement, and local partnerships to encourage sustainable behaviors and practices in nearshore waters.
3. **Monitoring** measures and documents current conditions, tracks progress following implementation of new management approaches, and uses data to identify areas where management actions need to be further adapted.

Focus: Engage Hawai'i fisher communities in nearshore marine management and supporting marine ecosystem health

Grant Range: Up to \$25,000

Grant Period: September 1, 2026 – August 31, 2028

Estimated Total Funds Available: \$100,000



4. ***Protection and Restoration*** builds on existing strategies to prevent damage to fragile nearshore ecosystems from invasive species, disease, and environmental damage events and expands efforts to restore and enhance impacted areas.”¹

Created by the Hawai'i Community Foundation (HCF), the CHANGE Framework was developed to better understand and address the most critical, complex challenges facing our community.² For Hawai'i's natural environment to flourish, our people must maintain a reciprocal relationship with 'āina, honoring traditional knowledge and practices that long secured abundance. This shared kuleana can become a thriving and resilient root system interconnecting equitable cultural, spiritual, mental, social, physical, and economic well-being for all life.³ HCF supports the efforts of the Holomua Marine Initiative through this lens of the CHANGE Framework, with the collaborative aim of working with communities to effectively manage our nearshore marine areas and resources.⁴

HCF sees the clear alignment between the vision set forth by the DLNR Division of Aquatic Resources for the Holomua Marine Initiative and HCF's vision for thriving communities, shared kuleana, and a reciprocal relationship with 'āina that honors the knowledge and practices that has long secured abundance.

Purpose

The purpose of this funding opportunity (FO) is to build pilina with Hawai'i's commercial and non-commercial fishers (lawai'a) by supporting their knowledge, practices, and leadership in caring for nearshore marine resources, and ensuring their voices are included in decisions that affect their way of life.

Grant Focus

Acknowledging the fisher community is highly diverse and includes subsistence, recreational, and commercial fishers, the activities that HCF will consider for funding in this proposal include (but are not limited to):

1. **Fisher Involved Data Collection & Research:** Supporting fisher-led and collaborative efforts that build on the knowledge, observations, and practices of fishers to better understand and care for nearshore resources. This includes documenting catch and seasonal patterns, shoreline or creel surveys, tagging projects, and monitoring of key species (e.g., limu, 'opihi, fish). Projects may also include co-developed research and the use of practical tools—both contemporary and traditional—that support data collection, sharing, and fisher-informed decision-making;
2. **Fisher Economies and Community Engagement:** Strategic use of fisher entrepreneurialism and market pathways (including subsistence markets) to engage fishers (e.g. fishing tournaments targeting invasive species such as “roi roundups”, business planning support for sustainable fishing organizations, fisher training and marketing for sustainable fish certification programs, etc.), and, events and activities

that utilize convening spaces such as community festivals and expos, fisher-involved campaigns targeting pollution or other threats to marine resources, integrating fishers into existing Holomua Marine Fund supported community projects and programs; and,

3. **Fisher Education, Outreach, and Communication:** Collaboration with retail fishing outlets to inform and engage fishers, use of storytelling opportunities through all forms of media, internships and fisher ambassador programs, formal education programs that inform, highlight, and promote fisher culture (including K-12 programs and tertiary fellowships), activities that promote lawai'a perspective such as fisher and 'ohana interviews, and, convening dialogue spaces that encourage discussion between fishers, natural resource management and science groups.

ELIGIBILITY & REQUIREMENTS

This is a competitive funding opportunity. Applicants must be a non-profit organization with a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status. Organizations who do not have 501(c)(3) status may work with a fiscal sponsor to apply for this funding opportunity.

Target Organizations: Applicants should have a lawai'a or commercial and/or non-commercial fisher focus explicitly expressed in their organization's mission, or are implementing an established program that focuses on commercial and/or non-commercial fishers (e.g., casting clubs, boating clubs, spearfishing clubs, pole fisher groups).

Grant Term: Grant requests for projects with a duration of up to 24 months (2 years maximum) will be considered. Funding decisions will be made in August 2026. Grant periods will begin September 1, 2026.

Funding: Grant requests for up to \$25,000 USD will be considered. Awards may be made for full or partial funding request, depending on application review and evaluation.

Reporting: Grantees will be required to submit a progress report (if project duration is longer than 12 months) and a final project report (including financial report) to HCF.



APPLICATION PROCESS

Online Application

Applications can be submitted online via the Hawai'i Community Foundation's Grants Portal: https://hawaiicf.smartsimple.com/s_Login.jsp using Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox.

Applicants must log in to their account to apply; new users must register for an account. We recommend that you do not wait until the last moment to submit your application as you may experience technical difficulties. Only complete applications submitted by the deadline will be accepted; this includes completion of Organization Profiles and associated fiscal sponsorship documents, if applicable.

ORGANIZATION PROFILE

Both new and returning users must certify and submit the organization profile prior to submission of the application; re-certification is required every six months.

The Organizational Profile consists of five tabs: *Organization Information, Contact Information, Budget, Board and Certification*. To submit your organization profile, you must complete all required fields marked with an asterisk on each tab.

APPLICATION

The application consists of four tabs: *Program Overview, Program Information, Budget, and Supporting Documents & Certification*. All required fields are marked with an asterisk.

- **Program Overview:**
 - Provide general information and characteristics about the program including program title, duration, program location(s), ages and genders served, and the CHANGE sector(s) your program most closely aligns with.

 - If you have a fiscal sponsor, you will be asked to identify your fiscal sponsor. Please note, your fiscal sponsor must first be registered in the Grants Portal prior to submitting your application.
- **Program Information:**
 - **Organization Description:** Describe the history and mission of the organization/program. What is the organization's experience implementing this program and staff capabilities to conduct the proposed work? How many staff and volunteers? (*Maximum 2,500 characters = ¾ page*)
 - **Problem or Opportunity:** Describe the need or opportunity you are trying to address and why this is critical. (*Maximum 3,000 characters = ¾ page*)
 - **Program Activities:** Describe the activities that will be completed to address the need/opportunity. Explain why you chose this approach. Provide a program timeline. Describe how your project aligns with the priority of the fund you are applying. (*Maximum 3,500 characters = 1 page*)



- **Expected Results:** Describe what you hope to achieve and how you will measure the effectiveness of your program. *(Maximum 3,500 characters = 1 page)*
- **Budget:** Provide your total program budget, amount requested through this application, and upload a copy of your program's budget, showing income and expenses, indicating sources of income that are pending and secured. *(Please Note: The HCF program budget template, which is provided in the "Resources" section of each applicant's HCF Grants Portal account, may be used).*
- **Supporting Documents & Certification:** Upload any additional required documents as listed in the application guidelines. If you are using a fiscal sponsor, please be sure that they certify your application prior to submission. *Not all funding opportunities require additional documents; review the tool tips in grey for details.*

ADDITIONAL REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

Please use this space to provide:

1. Letters or emails of support from collaborating organizations or agencies;
2. workplan for proposed activities *(Please Note: The HCF workplan template, which is provided in the "Resources" section of each applicant's HCF Grants Portal account, may be used);*
3. proposal budget narrative; and,
4. any strategies or plans that link your project or program and the needs identified in your proposal *(Please Note: These documents are not required, however, if your organization has these documents, they would be helpful).*

FISCAL SPONSORS

Fiscal sponsors must have an account in the portal. Their profile must be certified and include their IRS 501(c)(3) determination letter and up-to-date financial documents. Fiscal Sponsor Agreement and Board Resolution templates can be found at this [link](#).

- Starting July 28, 2025, **fiscal sponsors will be required to certify the application before it can be submitted by the applicant.** To do so, the applicant must invite the fiscal sponsor to collaborate on the draft application. The fiscal sponsor as a collaborator can then check the Fiscal Sponsor certification box under Supporting Documents & Certification.
